

## ABOUT THE AUTHOR



The author is a Master of Arts of the University of Edinburgh, where he studied palaeontology, human geography, and prehistoric archaeology, the latter under Professor V. G. Childe. Following this he was a postgraduate student in anthropology, Exeter College, Oxford University, under Dr. R. R. Marett.

During the last war the author was an officer in the Royal Artillery with the British Expeditionary Force, September 1939, and later a staff officer in the First Airborne Division. He was appointed Educational Adviser to the Allied Military Government in Italy, and concurrently held the office of Director of Education to the Armistice Control Commission in Italy. Later he was recalled to the Supreme HQ of the Allied Control Commission, to be Chief of Education and Religious Affairs in the Planning Unit for Germany.

After the war he was appointed Professor of Anthropology, and Head of the Postgraduate Department of Anthropogeography, in the University of Saugor, India. Here he initiated researches into the anthropology and human geography of the peoples of Central India. He was also an adviser for education and welfare for the tribal peoples of India to the Commissioner of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes.

The author received the degrees of D.Phil, from the University of Messina, D. Pol. Sc, from the University of Palermo, and D.Sc. from the University of Naples. In addition he was made a fellow of the Peloritana Academy, the Pontaniana Academy, the Royal (now National) Society of Naples, and of the Palermitan Academy. He was elected Honorary President of the Sicilian Anthropological Society, and is at the moment President of the Ethnological Society of Malta.

His biography is to be found in *The World Who's Who*, and in *The World Who's Who in Science*, as well as in some twenty other biographical works.

The writer has been Editor of *Mankind Quarterly* since 1960, and is the author of fifteen other published works including:
